


Increased Collaboration Between Retail & Federal Agencies—Like ORC Bill

How

- Reach out
- Get involved in planning and operational exercises
- Know your capabilities and needs and share them
- Get training to spot red flags that may indicate important information





Why

- Help avert terrorist attacks
- Reduce loss of life and property in an emergency
- Establish safety to move on to higher goals (Maslow's hierarchy of needs)
- Be prepared for all hazards

Starbuck's All Hazards Guide



- Divided into categories of natural disasters, public health incidents, unlawful acts and severe weather
- Directs Pre-, During and Post-Incident response
- Directives slightly altered for different categories
- Three core messages
 - Personal safety first
 - Make quick decisions focused on most critical tasks
 - Respond quickly to store operations



Starbuck's All Hazards Guide



- Safety
 - Maintain personal safety
 - Track partners to ensure safety
- Communications
 - Communication with associates
 - Communicating with local response resources
 - Leadership updates/communications
- Business continuity
 - Assess the situation





Take-aways

- Keep it simple
- Practice makes perfect
- Take a flexible, all-hazards approach
- Leverage each other's strengths





Recognizing Suspicious Behaviors

- Be aware and exhibit awareness
- Enroll everyone in your organization
- Identify suspicious people, vehicles, objects
- Investigate
- Report activity in detail



Reporting Suspicious Behaviors

INTERNAL

EXTERNAL



Vigilance to recognize potential incident.

Have clear guidelines on what to report and to whom.

Deliver info to designated internal resource. Receive and investigate information— collect as much detail as possible.

Report to authorities.




